

Good grades can give your more choices post 16






Your Core subjects



- Other schools and colleges will set their own subject requirements, but don't be scared if you want to study a subject like Business later on – they may well look at your Maths and English grades to make the decision




Career Considerations

- Computing & ICT cyber security, programming, software development, technical support, management, hardware specialists
- Sciences doctor, dentist, physiotherapist, veterinarian, marine biology, chemists, physicist, aerospace, engineering, biotechnology


What are employers looking for?

- Many jobs will have minimum qualification levels, you won't be considered without them
- Competition can be fierce for some jobs, so employers will look for applicants with the 'best' qualifications
- You are paid for the knowledge and skills we can bring to an employer
- However, for most jobs your soft skills, practical skills, hobbies, work experience, volunteering and personal qualities are just as important



Labour market information

Travel & Tourism - The travel and tourism industry was badly hit by the Covid pandemic but employment is now increasing. British Airways is employing 4000 new cabin crew to meet demand and similar recruitment is happening across the industry, including Jet2, EasyJet and Virgin Atlantic who are all heavily recruiting. Gatwick is opening up its second runway and holiday makers are desperate to travel again with travel agents and tour operators all reporting a massive surge in bookings.






CALLIGRAPHER

bother with acting or calligraphy.








ICE CREAM VENDOR






INSECT EXTERMINATOR
