## How banding works in Drama at KS3

After students have finished exploring a scheme of work, they will take part in a performance that showcases the particular skills they have been learning about in that term. However, the assessment band also takes into consideration the whole process of producing Drama, from creating, performing to evaluating. As different performance skills and techniques are explored at each scheme of work, it is not uncommon for students to perform better in some assessments over others. Therefore, this will be reflected in student's grade reports. The band students are awarded at the end of year however, will be based upon all assessments carried out in the year and should represent positive progression.

## As a guide:

In Year 7 students should be between a Band 2&4
In Year 8 students should be between a Band 4&6
In Year 9 students should be a Band 6 or above
