Curriculum

Edgbarrow School's curriculum consists of all those activities planned by the school to promote the students' intellectual, moral, social, spiritual and physical development and to prepare them for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of life. The curriculum is designed to help students to:

- acquire relevant understanding, knowledge and skills to allow them to thrive in a fast-changing world and prepare them for life after school;
- develop lively and enquiring minds, to develop the ability to question and argue rationally and to apply themselves to tasks and physical skills;
- be safe;
- use literacy, numeracy and ICT skills effectively;
- develop personal moral values;
- prepare pupils for life in modern Britain effectively, developing their understanding of the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, tolerance and respect;
- develop cultural capital to take their place in society in an informed, positive and active way, valuing education as a lifelong process.

Edgbarrow School's curriculum considers the context of the school, considering social make-up, ability profile, locality and employment prospects. The curriculum is designed with the following principles:

Breadth: Students study courses based on the National Curriculum at Key Stage 3, and flexible options programmes at Key Stage 4 and Post 16. A range of teaching and learning styles is to be encouraged, to ensure a richness of educational environment that enhances the experience of students.

Balance: Each area of learning is given appropriate attention to others and the curriculum as a whole. This includes sound guidance with options systems and the monitoring of cross-curricular experience.

Relevance: Learning is linked to students' own experience. The linkage of what is learnt to the needs of adult life is made plain. Opportunities are sought to develop schemes of work that facilitate this linkage, involving experiences both inside and outside the classroom.

Personalisation: Students are offered experiences carefully matched to their developing abilities, their aptitude and individual needs; students are taught in varying groupings, which reflect their abilities in a range of subject areas, to allow sufficient differentiation of the curriculum to meet the individual needs of students.

Progression and Continuity: Effective transition from Key Stage 2 to secondary education requires careful planning. Work undertaken at each stage is based on previous achievements. Each subject area operates carefully defined schemes of work that have given due consideration to this issue to ensure that students are offered material appropriate to their age and ability. KS3 supports preparation for KS4. Courses at Post 16 are offered to ensure progression from KS4 in a wide range of areas.

Ambition: There will be high expectations for student achievement, behaviour and personal development. Students will be expected to have high expectations of themselves. The curriculum and teaching and learning should provide an appropriate challenge that allows students to fulfil their potential.





Developing Students as Individuals

At Edgbarrow, we strive for all students to enjoy school life; we believe in creating a caring and supportive environment to achieve their full potential in academic and personal development.

We aim to develop well-rounded students who can extend their talents and acquire skills for life-long learning in an increasingly technological society. We encourage students to be confident, motivated and responsible citizens.



We believe that the curriculum extends beyond the classroom, so educational visits to local, national and international destinations regularly form part of the school calendar. We also value the importance of extracurricular opportunities for our students. The range of activities outside the classroom encourages our students to gain responsibility, contribute, and take pride in the school.

Student well-being is key to success and happiness. Throughout the curriculum we take opportunities to show students how to look after their physical and emotional well-being. We celebrate diversity and warmly welcome students with a range of additional needs.

Edgbarrow School seeks to reward students' achievements through a range of activities. All students have their efforts recognised through EDGpoints, certificates and participate in reward assemblies. Students receive effort points from their teachers which they can 'spend' in our Edgshop.

At the end of each year, our Key Stage 3 Celebration of Success evening recognises the effort and achievement of pupils during the year. We hold a Cream Tea event to celebrate students' exam results and those who have worked hard to be successful in their field during their Key Stage 4 and Key Stage 5 studies.

Uniform List

The wearing of the correct uniform while travelling to and from school and during the school day is very important to us. We feel that it sets the standard in terms of high expectations, and a purposeful attitude towards work, while promoting the school and our ethos. We rely very much on the co-operation of students and parents in helping us to set and maintain high standards of dress and appearance.

To ensure consistency and clarity, parents will be offered two recognised suppliers for purchasing some items of uniform:

- Sportswear International (SWI) for all badged items of uniform and PE kit.
- Trutex offer a skirt and trouser for girls and two styles of trousers for boys.

Equivalent items may be purchased from any high street retailer or supermarket and must be Harrow grey or dark grey in colour. All items of uniform and PE kit must be named. Refreshments and Food

Students may bring a packed lunch or buy a meal from school. Our caterers, Culinera, offer a wide range of hot and cold food and refreshments before school (8.10am - 8.40am), at break time and also at lunch time. Culinera also offer food after school for students taking part in co-curricular activities and revision sessions. We operate a cafeteria system and we use biometric cashless catering for payment. All students in Years 7 to 11 remain on site at lunchtime.

In general terms, your child will be eligible for free school meals if you are receiving Income Support or income-based Job Seeker's Allowance. If you would like more information about free school meals, please notify the school office or Head of Year.

The Curriculum

The curriculum is organised within a two-week cycle. Each week is composed of 25 lessons, each lasting for one hour.

Key Stage 3: Years 7, 8 and 9 (ages 11 – 14)

The lower school curriculum offers all students a broad and balanced course. The table shows the subjects, the number of periods taught per fortnight and how the students are grouped.

Key: M: Mixed Ability. S: Ability Sets.

For Mathematics, English, Modern Languages and Science, students are taught in sets based on their ability in these subjects.

Key Stage 4: Years 10 and 11 (ages 14-16)

All students study a core of subjects: English Language and English Literature, Mathematics, Science, Physical Education and PSHE (including Religious Education).

In addition, students may choose further subjects from:

GCSEs: Art, Business, Computer Science, Drama, Economics, French, Geography, History, Spanish, Philosophy, Ethics & Religion, Photography, Physical Education, Product Design, Psychology and Sociology.

Vocational Courses: The school offers a range of vocational courses in Creative iMedia, Business Studies, Hospitality & Catering, Engineering, Music, Performing Arts and Health & Social Care.

All courses lead to a GCSE qualification or equivalent. More details of courses available are to be found in the Options Booklet published in January each year for Year 9 students and parents.

Religious Education

Religious Education is delivered through our 'Philosophy, Ethics and Religion' (PER) curriculum and includes the study of all major world faiths. The curriculum is non-denominational and is based on enquiry into philosophical, moral, cultural and spiritual beliefs and practices. If a parent/carer has a concern about a specific aspect of the course, they should contact the Head of PER.

Sex and Relationships Education

Relationships and sex education at Edgbarrow follows the statutory framework set by the government. The curriculum is taught within PSHE lessons and covers themes in a timely and age-appropriate way. A range of topics will be covered, for example, healthy relationships, pregnancy, puberty, types of abuse and sexually transmitted diseases.

Emphasis is placed on providing full, honest information to promote caring relationships as well as offering student support and a safe place to discuss these topics. The school also operates a Help@Edgbarrow drop-in centre for Year 10 to 13 students, every Friday lunchtime run by local healthcare professionals.



Pastoral Care

Tutor Groups

The day-to-day care of the children is led by the Heads of Year, who receive a group in Year 7 and remain with them where possible until the end of Year 11. They are responsible for both the academic and social welfare of the children in their groups. Heads of Year are supported by Form Tutors, who are each responsible for 30 students. For routine matters, parents should contact the Form Tutor via or email. For more serious problems the Head of Year should be contacted.



School Nurse

The school has a qualified Lead First Aider on site, who is able to assess students' health and administer medicines with parental permission.

Attendance and Punctuality

It is expected that students will arrive at school and lessons on time. Students must arrive at school for 8.40am, ready for the first bell at 8.45am. The school site is open from 8.00am.

Please visit our [website](#) for more information. If we do not have a reason for a student's absence, under our First Day Response system, contact will be made with home.

If a child becomes ill whilst at school he/she will be looked after until such time as the child is able to return home. The school does have a Lead First Aider who can provide medical assistance where necessary. Contact will also be made with the parents as quickly as possible. In an emergency an ambulance may be called to take the child to hospital.

It is extremely important that emergency contact numbers are kept up to date. Please inform us immediately if personal details change.

Permission will not normally be given for family holidays during term time.

Behaviour Code

Relationships and behaviour across the school are excellent. Good behaviour is rewarded through giving EDGpoints, displays and award ceremonies. Students are encouraged to be ready, respectful, safe and to create a positive learning atmosphere in school. The [behaviour code](#) can be found on the school website.

The school has the highest expectations of students at all times and seeks to work with parents and carers to achieve the best outcomes. However, where this is not the case, students may be given advice, a verbal warning or a detention. In more serious matters a Head of Year may place a student on report or arrange for a student to work in isolation. School policies on Drugs, Anti-bullying, Exclusions and Behaviour can be viewed on the school website or obtained from the school on request.

Communication

Copies of all school policies, information, letters and newsletters can be obtained from the school website. The school uses SIMS InTouch® as our communication system for text messaging and email rather than letters, SIMS Parent app for easy access to attendance, reports and data and Class Charts for homework, timetable, and positive and negative behaviour information. We would require, where possible, for all parents to sign up for this system to aid good communication. This will enable us to send you grade reports and other key information throughout the year. We also have an online payment system for trips etc, details of which will be sent out shortly after your child starts school.

Class Charts

Each child and their parents will receive a Class Charts login bespoke to them. This account will provide access to students' daily rewards, sanctions, timetable and homework. This is an important means of communication between parents and school. We will use Google Classroom for students to upload and submit assignments and access resources.

We would appreciate it if parents would:

- Check that homework is being completed
- Celebrate with their child when rewards have been achieved
- Discuss with your child any negative behaviours or sanctions.
